








A Man's Got To Have A Hobby by William McInnes

It's about cane toads, families love and hope and fear, laughter, death and life. Most of all, it is a realistic, down-to-earth book by a man who had a great time growing up. His warmth and humour come through on every page.




A Month Of Sundays by Liz Byrski

And while all families like to believe they are special, round that kitchen table over all those years we also see played out our own hopes and fears, rivalries and tensions – the essential nature of family life.



The poet TS Eliot, with whom Iris shares fire watching duties, unwittingly seals their fate with his poem 'Little Gidding', one of the famous Four Quartets.



American Dirt by Jeanine Cummins


Jeanine Cummins's *American Dirt* follows Lydia Quixano Pérez, a bookstore owner in Acapulco, whose peaceful life shatters when her journalist husband publishes an exposé on Javier, the ruthless leader of a powerful drug cartel—and Lydia's charming customer. After her family is massacred in retaliation, Lydia and her eight-year-old son, Luca, flee north toward the United States. Their dangerous journey aboard *La Bestia*, the migrant train, brings them face to face with others escaping violence and despair. The novel is a gripping, emotional story of survival, motherhood, and the desperate hope for safety and freedom.



An Officer And A Spy by Robert Harris

Robert Harris's *An Officer and a Spy* retells the infamous Dreyfus Affair of late 19th-century France. When Jewish officer Alfred Dreyfus is wrongly convicted of treason and exiled to Devil's Island, intelligence officer Georges Picquart—initially convinced of Dreyfus's guilt—uncovers evidence suggesting the real spy remains free. As Picquart pursues the truth, he confronts corruption, deceit, and entrenched anti-Semitism within the French military and government. The novel vividly portrays a historic miscarriage of justice and explores themes of integrity, prejudice, and moral courage in the face of institutional betrayal.




At The End Of The Day by Liz Byrski

Then, in December of 1984, on mission STS-LR9, it all changes in an instant.




The Bookbinder Of Jericho by Pip Williams




The Crash by Freida McFadden


Cultish: The Language Of Fanaticism by Amanda Montell




Dark Emu by Bruce Pascoe

The evidence insists that Aboriginal people right across the continent were using domesticated plants, sowing, harvesting, irrigating and storing – behaviours inconsistent with the hunter-gatherer tag.


Gerritsen and Gammage in their latest books support this premise but Pascoe takes this further and challenges the hunter-gatherer tag as a convenient lie. Almost all the evidence comes from the records and diaries of the Australian explorers, impeccable sources




The Dry by Jane Harper

Luke Hadler turns a gun on his wife and child, then himself. The farming community of Kiewarra is facing life and death choices daily. If one of their own broke under the strain, well...




Eight Lives by Susan Hurley


Force Of Nature by Jane Harper




The Golden Spoon by Jessa Maxwell


At first, it's merely sabotage—sugar replaced with salt, a burner turned too high—but when a body is discovered, everyone is a suspect.

Under mounting pressure from the police and the media—as well as Amy's fiercely doting parents—the town golden boy parades an endless series of lies, deceptions, and inappropriate behaviour. Nick is oddly evasive, and he's definitely bitter—but is he really a killer? As the cops close in, every couple in town is soon wondering how well they know the one that they love. With his twin sister Margo, at his side, Nick stands by his innocence. Trouble is, if Nick didn't do it, where is that beautiful wife? And what was in that silvery gift box hidden in the back of her bedroom closet.



Goodwood by Holly Throsby

Goodwood is a small town where everyone knows everything about everyone. It's a place where it's impossible to keep a secret.

In 1992, when Jean Brown is seventeen, a terrible thing happens, two terrible things. Rosie White, the coolest girl in town, vanishes overnight. One week later, Goodwood's most popular resident, Bart McDonald, sets off on a fishing trip and never comes home. People die in Goodwood, of course, but never like this. They don't just disappear. As the intensity of speculation about the fates of Rosie and Bart heightens, Jean, who is keeping secrets of her own, and the rest of Goodwood are left reeling.


Rich in character and complexity, its humour both droll and tender, Goodwood is a compelling ride into a small community, torn apart by dark rumours and mystery.



H Is For Hawk by Helen Macdonald

Hamnet by Maggie O'Farrell




The Hand That First Held Mine by Maggie O'Farrell

As Ted begins to search for answers, an extraordinary portrait of two women is revealed, separated by fifty years, but connected in ways that neither could ever have expected.




Here One Moment by Liane Moriarty

Liane Moriarty is a modern-day Jane Austen who humorously skewers social mores while spinning a web of mystery and asking profound, universal questions.




Highway 13 by Fiona McFarlane
